Sunday evening, Jan. 15, Diocal youth ministers and teens from around the Bay Area met at Grace Cathedral for an overnight adventure of learning, worship, community-building, and service. Our teens served in Grace Cathedral’s contemplative Eucharist commemorating Martin Luther King, Jr. We listened to parts of the sermon King preached in that same space in March, 1965 and we explored King’s relevance for today. After crazy games in the darkened Cathedral, we prayed Compline and went to sleep.

Monday morning, we awoke early for a quick breakfast before heading out to serve at Bayview Mission. Once there, we cleaned out the chicken coop and organized and stored donations. Our thirteen, eager, youth got a lot of work done in just over an hour! We joined the Diocesan staff and other Episcopal church members to march in San Francisco’s annual MLK march. The beautiful diversity of all who marched was a vivid reminder of King’s words that light can, in fact, drive out darkness. Love can actually drive out hate.

In this season after Epiphany, may we carry Christ’s Light into the world as we work, walk, play, and pray for and with our neighbors.




## The Enneagram in the Narrative Tradition Panel

*With beginnings in the early Christian desert fathers and mystic traditions, the Enneagram has evolved as a powerful spiritual and psychological system of nine distinct personality patterns of thinking, feeling and behaving.*

Through listening to individuals share observations of themselves, we come to a greater understanding and compassion of ourselves and others. When we identify our pattern, we are given an invitation to observe ourselves, our gifts and our liabilities with greater accuracy and humility. This is a vital tool for spiritual growth and ultimately more compassionate relationships. A panel is a group of people who identify as a certain type in the Enneagram system.

Through the generosity of an anonymous underwriter, we will be welcoming guest conductor Richard Webster at the 5pm Saturday, February 4<sup>th</sup> Evensong and also at the 10am Sunday, Feb. 5 Choral Eucharist. He will be working with the St. Paul's Choir from Thursday through Sunday as part of preparations for the choir's Gloucester Residency in July 2017.

Richard is Director of Music and organist at Trinity Church, Boston, leading a renowned choral program, concert series and weekly organ recital series. Last August, the Trinity choirs made their third tour of England, with residencies at Westminster Abbey and Winchester Cathedral. As a composer, Richard completes several commissioned works a year and travels extensively to direct hymn festivals and choral workshops. In 2011, he was made an honorary Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music (FRSCM). He received an honorary Doctor of Music degree from the University of the South, Sewanee in 2016.

Richard is organist and Choirmaster Emeritus of St. Luke's Church, Evanston, IL where, from 1974 to 2003, he led the Choir of Men and Boys, Girls Choir, Schola and St. Luke's Singers in an active program of worship, concerts, tours and recordings. The restoration of the 1922 E. M. Skinner organ was completed in 1998 under his leadership. Webster studied organ with Peter Fyfe, Karel Paukert and Wolfgang Rübsam. He has performed and recorded with the Chicago and Milwaukee Symphony Orchestras.

A passionate runner, Richard has completed 32 marathons, including 14 Boston Marathons, costumed as J.S. Bach, Paul Revere, Abraham Lincoln, Robin, the Cat in the Hat, Prince William, Robin Hood, Olaf (from Frozen), a Krispy Kreme doughnut and the Cash Cow.
