The Gospel

John 20:1-18

Reader The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

MUSIC NOTE FOR EASTER DAY 2022

Happy Easter! On this Day of Resurrection, Strings and French Horns join with the Choir of St. Paul's and St. Paul's 1929 Skinner organ as Gloria and Alleluia are restored to the liturgy. Youth from the Choir School sing at both services, grades K-3 joining in a special treble anthem, **Risen Lord**, at the 9am service.

The **Gloria** and **Sanctus** from the *Missa Brevis in D, K194* were composed by **Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart** (1756-1791) at the age of 18 for Salzburg Cathedral. Published posthumously in 1793, this boisterous *Missa Brevis* was the first mass by Mozart to be published.

Psalm. When he was born on St. Cecilia's Day on November 22, 1913, **Benjamin Britten's** mother was determined that her son would join the 3 Bs of the musical canon (Bach, Beethoven, and Brahms). Britten's choral *oeuvre* is well known in the Anglican choral tradition, including some particularly wonderfully whimsical creations. The sopranos and altos of the choir join in Britten's cymbal-crashing **Psalm 150** this Easter Day.

Anthems. The offertory anthem is a jubilant setting of **The Day of Resurrection** from the Paschal Canon by John of Damascus (c. 645-749) for double choir by Australian composer **Melissa Dunphy** (b. 1980). Dunphy immigrated to the United States in 2003, and specializes in vocal, political, and theatrical music. She holds a Ph.D. in music composition from the University of Pennsylvania and teaches composition at Rutgers University. Through the lyrical choral setting of **I know that my redeemer liveth** by the English contemporary composer **Cecilia McDowall** (b. 1951) sung at the communion, one might hear anew this scriptural text sung by a soprano soloist in Handel's *Messiah*.

Prelude and Postlude. The final movement of the **Piano Quartet in A-flat Major** by **Fanny Hensel**, for piano, violin, viola, and cello, is offered as the prelude to set the joyous tone of the day, composed in 1822 when she was 17 years old. The work seems inspired by Mozart's two piano quartets (1785-86) and perhaps an 1821 piano quartet composed by her famous younger brother, Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy, though the piano's role in Fanny's piano quartet is like that for a solo concerto, rather than a chamber work. Unlike Mozart's *Missa Brevis* publication history, this work was not published until 1989, 142 years after Fanny Hensel's death. Fanny Hensel, geb. Mendelssohn (1805-1847) was a German pianist and composer of tremendous musical talent and skill. While Fanny's works were only heard in Sunday musicales (*Sonntagsmusiken*) at the Hensel home in Berlin, Felix's reached international audiences. The postlude is by the French organist and composer **Charles-Marie Widor** (1844-1937). Widor was organist of St.-Sulpice, Paris from 1871 to 1934 and the composer of ten celebrated symphonies for organ, the fifth closing with this famous **Toccata**.


