The First Lesson Wisdom 3: 1-9

A reading from the Book of Wisdom

The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them. In the eyes of the foolish they seemed to have died, and their departure was thought to be a disaster, and their going from us to be their destruction; but they are at peace. For though in the sight of others they were punished, their hope is full of immortality. Having been disciplined a little, they will receive great good, because God tested them and found them worthy of himself; like gold in the furnace

he tried them, and like a sacrificial burnt offering he accepted them. In the time of their visitation they will shine forth, and will run like sparks through the stubble. They will govern nations and rule over peoples, and the Lord will reign over them forever. Those who trust in him will understand truth, and the faithful will abide with him in love, because grace and mercy are upon his holy ones, and he watches over his elect.

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Church in Thessalonica

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord

himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

We also pray for friends and family members of those in our community who have died, along with all whom we carry in our hearts who have gone to their eternal rest. I invite prayers of remembrance for any whom you may wish to name, either silently or aloud.

The people are invited to add their own prayers silently or aloud.

God of grace, you promise eternal life to all who receive your mercy. Bring all who rest in Christ into the fullness of your kingdom where sins have been forgiven and death has been swallowed up in life.

Lord, in your mercy. Hear our prayer.

Loving Shepherd, you desire that none should be lost. Gather all who feel betrayed or abandoned. Be near to the vulnerable, especially immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees; near to all whose trust has been shaken, and all whose faith is known to you alone, that each may know your provision, peace, and life everlasting.

Lord, in your mercy. Hear our prayer.

Mighty Savior, you bring joy out of grief and life out of death. Look with mercy upon all who mourn. Carry us in our times of struggle, suffering, and darkness. Strengthen us by the healing power of your steadfast love.

God of transformation, you are tender towards your children. Your gentleness surrounds creation. Heal our memories of hurt and our failure to honor your image in one another. Give us wisdom and courage to use the time we are given here on earth to serve all whom Jesus loves, as we follow in your way of sacrificial love.

Gentle God, you move us to compassion. We remember veterans of this nation and members of diverse tribes and nations who have laid down lives in service to peoples and countries. Transform the hatred and pride that polarize your family and destroy community through discord and division. Heal our human pain.

Lord of kindness, you inspire our care for one another. We thank you for tenderhearted friends in this community, especially all who orchestrate St. Paul's Celebration of Life gatherings. May their ministry honor those we whom love and see no longer. Reveal your presence with us, comforting us amid loss and sorrow.

Merciful Creator, entrusting into your care all whom you have made, we give thanks for our communion with all your faithful people, as we make our prayers through the grace of Jesus Christ our Savior. **Amen.**



The Celebrant continues the Eucharistic Prayer, giving thanks for God's work of redemption through Jesus Christ and consecrating the bread and wine for Holy Communion. The people join in sacramental witness, speaking to the mystery of God's saving grace.

... Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, Most Holy God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in Christ. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us and all your saints into the joy of your eternal Reign.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory are yours, Most Blessed One, now and forever. **AMEN**.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name,

thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

The Breaking of the Bread

The Celebrant breaks the Bread. A period of silence is kept.

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.

Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!

Invitation to Communion

The Celebrant lifts the bread and wine saying,

The gifts of God for the people of God. If you feel drawn to this table, let nothing keep you away.

All are welcome to receive Communion. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request. Ushers will see that Communion is brought to you at your seat, should you request it.

The Communion and Offering of Flowers

After receiving Communion, the people are invited to receive a rose from the Altar Guild and proceed to the back of the Church for a brief moment of prayer and to offer a flower at the Table of Remembrance by the font.
