A Reading from the Book of Exodus.

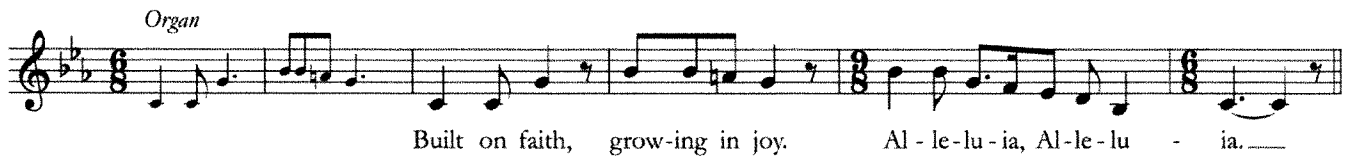
The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or

boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

The Second Lesson

Romans 13:8-14

A Reading from the Letter of Paul to the Church in Rome.

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.
Besides this, you know what time it is, how it

is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Prelude. Today's prelude is the sixth of the *Fanfares for the Uncommon Woman* composed by American Joan Tower (b. 1938), the title a play on the iconic *Fanfare for the Common Man* by Aaron Copland (1900-1990), heard in a transcription for organ as last Sunday's postlude. Tower composed her fanfares from 1987 through 2016 for brass and orchestral ensembles, the sixth also transcribed for piano. Tower's fanfares are a tribute to women who "are adventurous and take risks," each dedicated to an inspiring woman in music. One might think of Tower herself who found her compositional voice in a period dominated by male composers.

Happy Labor Day! Today's processional hymn 541 - *Come, labor on* - has particular resonance as we mark Labor Day and enter the new rhythms of the fall. By Scottish hymnwriter Jane Laurie Borthwick (1813-1897), the hymn draws on Matthew 9:37-38:

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.'

Borthwick first published "Come, labor on" in her *Thoughts for Thoughtful Hours* (London, 1859) as a hymn for church workers. She published under the pseudonym H. L. L., the initials of the title of a four-volume series of German hymns she had earlier translated with her sister, *Hymns from the Land of Luther*.

A Centennial Mass. Throughout these centennial celebration months, all are invited to join in a musical journey to learn *A Centennial Mass* by Canadian Sarah MacDonald. The sixth commission by a woman composer underwritten by the Marcia McCowin Estate Fund, *A Centennial Mass* was composed in spring 2026 for the choir and congregation of St. Paul's in celebration of the centennial of the laying of St. Paul's cornerstone. MacDonald is Cambridge University Organist, Director of the Girls' Choir at Ely Cathedral and Director of Music at Selwyn College, Cambridge. Appointed to the Selwyn post in 1999, she is the first woman to hold a director of music position in an Oxbridge Chapel. Visit the choir room to see her new portrait in the composer timeline.

The journey began at our first centennial service on June 7th at which the choir premiered six of the thirteen movements of *A Centennial Mass*. During the summer, the congregation was invited to join in singing the *Psalm Refrain*, *Alleluia Verse* and *Sanctus*. At the August 30th centennial service, the choir added the *Trisagion* and a second choral offering of the *Gloria*. Today, all begin to learn the *Gloria*! The journey culminates with all singing *A Centennial Mass* at the 10am Sunday Eucharist on February 7, joined by a chamber orchestra and choristers from the cathedrals of St. Mark's Seattle, Trinity Portland and Grace San Francisco, as part of the Chorister Festival West.
